On 16 June 1976, the youth of South Africa had had enough. They were tired of overcrowded classrooms, undertrained faculty staff, poor facilities and separation in schools. However, what really tipped these learners over the edge was the decision to make Afrikaans a language of instruction at secondary school level. This naturally made learners very upset, so they took to the streets and protested against the Bantu Education System of the time. This protest was a long time coming considering the state of affairs of the Bantustans in which black individuals were forced to reside. I'm sure that you have all seen the photo of Hector Petersen being carried away by his friend after he was killed by a police officer during the protest.

So, what does this event which happened a long time ago mean to us today? To be honest, it means a lot. Because of this event, the anti-Apartheid movement really got going, ultimately leading to the emancipation of the black population in the country. However, education itself is still not equal despite the anti-Apartheid movement. There is still a large gap between the rich and the poor and the level of education that they can afford. Many schools catering to lower-income groups are overcrowded and under-funded by government. Meanwhile, there are some schools where the yearly fees are above R80 000 per year boasting sports facilities and new-age technology. The country is still far away from reaching equal education for all. Even the #FeesMustFall movement was inspired by the 1976 Soweto Riots. Even in higher education there is a big difference in lived experience between the rich and the poor.

CityKidz finds itself within an interesting sphere. It seeks to address this inequality in basic education by offering quality instruction at an affordable rate. CityKidz believes in equal opportunity for all, and we sicerely hope to see your child thrive in secondary school and beyond. 
