

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Science Club news

On Monday, 4 September the Science Club had a meeting with Dr. Lungile Sithole, senior lecturer and researcher in the Department of Biochemistry at the University of Johannesburg. This was a very exciting event. Mr. Mathekga briefed learners on how meetings are planned, how to compile an agenda, and how to record minutes.

It was insightful for learners to hear that Science has such a big effect on South Africa's economy and development. They were obviously surprised to realise that the University of Johannesburg acknowledges and supports their club. Mr. Mathekga briefed Dr. Sithole about the Science Club's vision and mission and future plans to liaise with the university. This was an important cornerstone that was laid between primary schools and uni-

versities. We hope to close the gap between these two learning institutions. Learners can now produce quality work and attempt to measure it against the highest standards.

Dr. Sithole was impressed by the extent of the science development at CityKidz. She also expressed her thanks to CityKidz for taking such an initiative. One of SA's Top 200 young South Africans receives PhD in Biochemistry



Dr Lungile Sitole, one of the *Molf & Guardian top 200 young South Africans in 2015 and a recipient of a 'Women in Science' (WISA) award from the Department of Science and Technology in 2014, received her PhD degree in Biochemistry at the University of Pretoria's recent Spring graduation ceremonies.

As the title of her PhD indicated, "Spectroscopic evaluation of HIV positive sera reveals metabolic signatures of infection", Dr Sitole is involved in research to try and unlock new methods for monitoring HIV disease progression and individual responses to treatment. She is currently a Postdoctoral Fellow at the University of Johannesburg.

In 2009, Dr Sitole completed her MSc (cum laude) in organic chemistry at Jackson State University's School of Science, Engineering and Technology in Mississippi, USA. Before tackling her PhD she worked as a researcher for the Council of Scientific and Industrial Research.







Bullying

To understand what bullying is, a clear definition is needed:

When someone says or does something <u>unintentionally</u> hurtful and they only do it once, that is <u>not nice</u>.

When someone says or does something <u>intentionally</u> hurtful and they do it once, that is <u>mean</u>. But when someone says or does something <u>intentionally</u> hurtful and they keep doing it <u>over a period of time</u>, even when you tell them to stop or show them that you are upset, <u>that is bullying</u>.

The bullied person may experience physical memories and traumas for a long time afterwards. There is a sense of abandonment and isolation. There may be absenteeism from school and physical symptoms such as epileptic fits, depression, ideas of suicide and suicide may be displayed. Victims are not always nerds or wimps.

The bully may often be popular and well-liked by teachers, may have great self-esteem and can often get away with murder, especially if there are no consequences.

The bystanders or witnesses to the bullying suffer trauma too and may be scared to get involved or to report the bully.

Bullying is not a normal part of growing up and does not build character. Children must be taught to respond and to defuse the situation using tools like humour or by showing self-confidence. It is important to teach victims that good posture and eye contact may deter the bully and cause him or her to lose interest and to look for another victim.

Bullies tend to blame-shift and don't take responsibility. They feed on fear and attention, and break relationships as they are often perceptive and good judges of character.

What creates a bully? We can only give what we have. Parents need to be role models and to live by the values they are teaching their children. In other words, you must practise what you preach. When it comes to competitive behaviour, we must consider what we are teaching our children. Family dynamics, temperament and genetics may all play a part in the creation of a bully. Children should not be indulged, but should rather be taught to build resilience and learn from their struggles. When parents won't admit that there is a problem with their child (the bully), then an objective expert may need to be consulted.

It is important to listen to your child, to hear and acknowledge. The child's self-esteem and self-awareness must be built in order to give him/her strength. They must be taught the difference between being kind and being nice, so that they can set boundaries and not feel that they have to please everyone.

In conclusion: if a child can think on his/her feet and can respond to a bully without seeming to be intimidated, that is an important life skill. We need to empower our children and give them the tools to navigate the often difficult journey through life.
