

leaders, ready to take on whatever comes next.

























Grade 4 Edufarm Camp


We extend our heartfelt thanks to the Principal, teachers, staff at EduFarm Camp and parents who helped make this trip a safe and meaningful experience for all.

Starting off with a blank grid where they are free to move to any of the blocks to reach the finish line, making it harder by then placing objects on some of the blocks, now requiring them to put their problem-solving skills to the test to avoid running into the obstacles.

The engagement by the learners in the lesson was so heartwarming, to watch them have discussions on which route to take, to them visually calculating the routes using their hands.

They were able to quickly recognise any obstacles ahead and solve the grid puzzle with surprising accuracy.

We are looking forward to seeing the Grade R's blossom and being able to conquer today's technological advances.






















Theo Jackson Scholarship attendees

The Spelling Bee isn't just about spelling difficult words—it's about confidence, focus, and having fun with language. It's a chance to show off your hard work, challenge yourself, and cheer on your classmates as they take on the buzz-worthy challenge.

To help you get prepared:

- □ Practice new and tricky words every day.
- ☐ Try spelling words out loud in front of family or friends.
- □ Remember: it's not only about winning, it's about learning and being brave enough to try!



There will be excitement in the air, proud moments for every participant, and plenty of cheering from the audience. So, let's sharpen those pencils, open those dictionaries, and get ready to spell, sparkle, and shine!

Who will be crowned our Spelling Bee Champion this year? We can't wait to find out — let the countdown begin!

Think spelling is just about memorising words? Think again! With over a million words in the English language, you can't learn them all. The secret? Spot patterns, learn the rules and read often.

What's a spelling pattern? A spelling pattern is when certain letters often appear together.

For example:

- -ing (playing, singing, jumping, calculating)
- -ight (light, night, bright, slight, flight)

i before e except after c. (believe, thief, brief, grief)

However, if the preceding consonant is c, the rule is reversed:

'e' comes before 'i' (receive, deceive, perceive).

Essential Spelling Rules (with exceptions!)

These rules help but always check tricky words in a dictionary.

Every syllable must have a vowel

No vowel = not a syllable. - e.g. kick/ing, app/le


English language words don't end in "v" or "j"

Use -ve instead, like give or have.

Keep the "y" when adding a suffix

play \rightarrow playing /played





Great news ... it's a whole-school competition again!!! The Rhythm Robot All Class Challenge is aimed at taking something ordinary – paper, toilet rolls, milk bottles, straws, any recyclable materials and repurposing them to create a colourful, functional robot that has at least 2 movements.

This time, the competition is per class. (Non-Homeroom teachers, Admin and Maintenance will be allocated to assist a class.)

At CityKidz we want to encourage and showcase how robotics and recycling can inspire our learning and convey a powerful social message. Each class needs to create an awesome robot made from any recyclable materials that also has an inspirational message and/or quote.

In addition, the robot must be placed on board, a track or a stand that represents the world the robot comes from and/or lives in. This should be decorated, with a related robot/robotics theme.

The specifications for the robot are: minimum height: 30cm

must be able to move in two (2) ways

Each class will submit a single entry. The project will focus on teamwork, foster collaboration, research and cohesion. Over the next couple of months, you need to encourage learners to do research, make designs, collect materials! Encourage responsible sourcing, set up teams and organise task lists. Start sourcing glue, paint, varnish and other essentials, if needed.

How you, as a class, go about this, is entirely up to your class, but it is important to get your parents involved.

Remember, the robot will be showcased as one class entry with two items per class. It might seem easier this way, but the competition is going up a level. This year, 2025, CityKidz opened its Al centre. Like last year we will be inviting external judges for the competition to ensure impartiality and fairness. This adds to the excitement and allows for our CityKidz community to be involved.





The humble pipe cleaner, with its fuzzy texture and flexible wire core, is a wonderful way for creating an endless array of shapes and figures. It's a simple activity that builds skills and sparks imagination in kids and adults alike.


Learners let their imagination run wild and some true magic happened. First there was a twisty body, then antennae and hey presto, a butterfly! Next came a coiled shell and head for a snail, then a long body and legs for a spider. Learners made flowers and or even wearable art like crowns and bracelets.




